HOPE STUDENTS ENGAGE IN NATIONAL TESTING

At HICA (Hope International Christian Academy), in May each year, the ninth and twelfth grade students travel to a testing center three times a week to take the West

African Examination Council (WAEC) test. This exam is a month-long process which holds high stakes. If a student does not pass the exam, he or she is not promoted to the next grade. For seniors, this means that they do not graduate. We are pleased that HICA students have a 99% pass rate. We celebrate in this while knowing that there is much work ahead of us as we strive towards increasing literacy and providing high quality education at HICA.

Tim Sigman from International Students Inc. (ISI) was able to join Martin on the trip to Liberia in May this year. Martin & Tim were able to work as a team developing a new statement of faith as professional development (PD) tool for the BOH teaching staff. The response of the teachers was very encouraging as they shared how the PD inspired them to make life changing steps personally and implement changes to their future teaching methods. Tim was able to share the Jesus video in the local Kpelle language with almost 100 of the students and many family members. One mother was in tears and deeply touched by a movie in her heart language. Teachers said that seeing the life of Jesus portrayed in their own language was powerfully engaging. Tim was able to leave a copy of the movie in Kpelle with Elijah the principle and he is planning to show it to the whole student body in the future. Martin and Tim taught the school children many new worship songs as Tim played guitar and Martin played the drum. The songs Fear Not and Amazing Grace were powerful to hear with over 300 voices joined together in worship in the auditorium.



GETTING WATER FROM THE WELL

Life in Liberia had its challenges, one of which, prior to our installation of a submersible pump in the new well, was pumping water from a well and carrying it to the village. However, doing it with the kids was one of my favorite activities. Sometimes 5 or more kids would



help us carry water, but occasionally it was only Adonesia and Joshua, the principle's sons who carried water. They worked hard and never complained, even though carrying a full five-gallon bucket of water balanced on their heads was hard work, especially since we had to go up hill and do it multiple times. During the trips we would talk and pick on each other. Joshua explained what the different plants were and described how they made rice bread. Adonesia got a real kick telling us to go and take a nap because we "needed" to rest. I turned the joke on him when we left and gave him the eye cover given out

on airplanes and told him he needed to take a nap. We did many things at the well such as putting pebbles down each other's shirts and climbing palm trees. They only climbed about 6 feet high because I got nervous and wouldn't let them go any further. The kids really knew how to have a great time while doing such a chore.

Having worked on a service project in Hope Village last summer as well, ESA knows that the people of Hope Village are kind, generous, and dedicated students and teachers. They must work hard every day to get safe water, pumping it by hand from a well and then carrying it back home to use, so our goal this year was to help the community by improving access to clean water. In May we spent three weeks in Liberia working on fixing a disused water tower in the village, developing a piping network from the water tower to different locations in the village, and making repairs and improvements to the rainwater harvesting system we built there last year. It was a wonderful experience that our team members will never forget!
