## 'FARMING GOD'S WAY' TRAINING

Paul Schlosser and Olivia Briggs headed up a Farming God's Way training at Hope from March 10-12. The first day started with thirtyfive attendees consisting of teachers, senior Hope students, and local farmers. They began training learning about biblical keys that defined how God, the first farmer, provided us with all the tools we need to successfully produce food. Overcoming the generational farming mindset instilled in Liberian culture was the main obstacle; however, those that God brought forth to learn, eagerly listened and asked a plethora of questions. Their understanding came quickly after opening their minds and faith to God's way of farming. On the second day, the students were hungry for more knowledge and jumped at the opportunity to receive firsthand experience. Those who understood concepts quicker eagerly explained concepts to their peers who struggled. Seeing the group come together in just two days truly showed God was working in their hearts and strengthening their faith. On the third day, we no longer had thirty-five students but over forty. Onlookers who became curious after hearing their family members, neighbors, or friends talk about the training, came to observe, and absorb the knowledge that God was providing through Paul. On the third day, as written in the Bible, the garden was prepared and planted. A 6-meter by 6-meter plot of beans, corn, and sweet potato were planted by the hands of our students. Even when the gardening was done and God blessed it with rainfall, the students continued working hard to finish a compost pile not missing the opportunity to ask as many questions as possible. The desire to learn was apparent within the group and it allowed for not only them to gain more knowledge, but for Paul and Olivia to gain understanding about the Liberian culture of farming. The garden began sprouting 4 days after planting and is now being watched over by Elijah Kobbia, a recent graduate of Hope. Our desire is that this training will be incorporated into a school curriculum so that students can learn how to create sustainable food systems.
