For those of you who didn't know, I got sick with abdominal pain on March 1, 2025. I underwent surgery for small intestine obstruction. I was then diagnosed with MALT Lymphoma. A cancer that is treatable and curable, praise be to our God. We saw the oncologist who reviewed all of my records and gave me a good prognosis. He said I do not need treatment at this time since the PET scan did not show cancer anywhere else in my body. I will continue to follow up with him every 3 months,

with CT scan and laboratory blood work. I am so grateful to God for His healing mercy. Secondly, I am grateful for Dr. Statz. He was not just my surgeon but a father to me. He was totally a God send. He was able to do a clean-cut during surgery without any other finding to be seen on the PET scan. Lastly, I want to praise God for the medical service we have here in the US, and that I did not go on the medical mission trip and get sick in Liberia or on the flight going or coming.

2025 BRIDGES OF HOPE MEDICAL MISSION – SURGICAL SITE AT PHEBE HOSPITAL

Our surgical site included 8 members completing 22 surgeries in 6.5 surgical days at Phebe Liberia Hospital. The team removed 17 thyroid goiters, repaired 4 large groin hernias and 1 large shoulder lipoma. With the donated supplies, the help from our surgical team, and our pre-op/PACU staff, the local surgeons from Phebe Liberia were able to complete an additional 122 surgeries, which included hernia repairs, hysterectomies/large uterine fibroid removals and lipoma removals. Our Bridges of Hope surgical team collaborated with the Phebe hospital staff throughout our patients' entire length of stay and provided post operative and continuing lifestyle education. Our 2 Monument Health CRNAs also had the opportunity to teach at the Phebe School of Nurse Anesthesia and provide hands-on learning experience in the operating room with a Monument Health donated video laryngoscope and other educational materials.

While in the country, our team visited the markets in Gbarnga and saw one of the patients who had her thyroid goiter removed earlier in the week. The patient was so grateful to the team and said, "you gave me my face back." This was truly humbling to the team members that they were able to provide such a life-changing procedure.

The surgical team was immersed in Liberian culture through the local church, art, cuisine, and music. Their hearts are forever changed by the hospitality received and friendships made along the way. Thank you to our Bridges of Hope board members, prayer teams, and families at home who supported their work and made these life changing procedures possible.

2025 BRIDGES OF HOPE MEDICAL MISSION - CLINIC SITE AT HOPE INTERNATIONAL CHRISTIAN ACADEMY SCHOOL

Our Rapid City clinic team members joined with our Liberian medical partners to fulfill a successful medical mission in 2025. With Martin falling ill just days before our scheduled departure, our team quickly



rallied to do whatever was necessary. We applied a successful triage strategy and cared for 909 patients in just seven days of clinic. We saw patients ranging in age from two weeks to 87 years. The sickest patients were seen within the first three days of the clinic treating many for typhoid and malaria, various infections, and uncontrolled hypertension. We saw many dehydrated and malnourished children and are so thankful for the donation of 60 cans of powdered A2 infant formula directly from the A2 Milk Company.

On Day 2, a 10-year-old boy presented with a nail puncture wound to the foot with no tetanus vaccination history. A local pharmacy had the vaccine which we administered along with

hydrated, and get their first dose of anti-malarial medication in their systems. We laid hands and prayed for both. After about 2 hours of care and prayer, they were both able to get up and walk home! Without treatment, they were most certainly at risk of death. We thank God for the quick-thinking and dedicated team members, the medications we had to treat their symptoms and malaria, and Jehovah Rapha, our healer.

antibiotics and prayer. By the following week, he was happy to show us his healed foot. Two extremely ill patients with acute malarial symptoms presented to the clinic on Day 3. One of our Liberian nurses had a rapid-diagnostic test for malaria in his first aid kit. Both patients tested triple positive. Our entire team rallied together to care for these patients: get their symptoms under control with medication, keep them

A timeline of some of the many milestones.

Summer of 2005 - Rev. Padmore shared a dream to establish a school and orphanage in rural Liberia.

August 2005 - Purchased fifty acres in Liberia.

September of 2005 - Incorporated as a non-profit corporation in South Dakota.

October 2005 - Purchased the domain name bridgesofhopewestafrica.com.

January of 2006 - Engineering Ministries International surveyed the property and sketched the plan for a 12-room school surrounded by small homes to accommodate teachers and children.

January 2006 - Ground was broken for the first six classrooms.

June 2006 - Received our charitable status from the IRS.

Summer 2006 – Life Water Canada drills first well.

September 2006 - 120 children are attending school.

February 2007 - The school is dedicated.

Fall 2007 - 240 children are in school.

2007 – 2008 - Eight homes are constructed with donations from individuals and churches to house teachers and orphans. They are arranged in "pods" of four duplex homes with a cook "shack" in the center of each group of homes. Seventeen orphans are being cared for in the village. A Toyota Hilux pickup truck was purchased to serve the needs of the school. UN Construction: Hope Village leadership entered into an agreement with UN High Commissioner for Refugees, who were resettling some Sierra Leone refugees in Liberia, asked us to take refugee children. We agreed to take thirty students from them. UNHCR helped with two wells, two community pit latrines, a three-classroom structure and seating for the classrooms they will construct.

2009 - Lend a Hand is established to meet the needs of Hope Village students and orphans with the Adopt a Teacher & Classroom project. 11 pallets of books gathered from area schools by Lee and Robbie Ahrlin were shipped by container to Hope Village.

October 2012 - A child sponsorship program was established, \$120 to support a child.

2017 - A deep well was drilled by life Water Canada that provided abundant clean water no matter the time of year, rainy or dry season.

2018 - An 8-kilowatt generator was donated and shipped to Hope Village by GenPro Energy Solutions. Nine donors contributed to a replacement truck for the 10-year-old Toyota Hilux delivered to Hope International Christian Academy (HICA). The roof of the school was replaced. Students from SDSM&T made their first visit to Hope Village. In subsequent visits each year they worked to build a structure to house the generator, install a submersible pump in the well, replace a tank on the water tower, run water lines to the school, bury electrical lines, and construct a sanitary toilet.

2017 – 2018 - Martin & Stephanie Digler join the board of Bridges, assume leadership & cast a vision for future endeavors for the organization. In addition to a Christ-Centered education, they established a vision to bring quality health care to Liberia and established a Bible teaching church on campus. Arlen & Gwen Pequette became "coordinators", undertaking a new student sponsorship program.

November 2018 - Teachers Stephanie Digler & Kari Smith work with teachers to provide encouragement & professional development to the staff, meet with teachers to best help our Education Committee partner to promote a Christ-centered education.

Spring 2019 - HOPE SCHOOL RANKED #1 IN DISTRICT

2020 - All of the homes in the village were renovated, repairing structures, replacing roofs with a steeper, more durable roof and fresh paint.

2021 - New student sanitary latrines open. Fall Medical Mission Team provides surgical services at Phebe Hospital and walk-in clinic at Hope Village School.

2022 - Sanitary toilets were installed in the village homes.

2023 - A new database for students and sponsors was developed to better track student progress and sponsor coordination.

January of 2024 - Medical Mission Team provides surgical services at Phebe Hospital and walk-in clinic at Hope Village School.

March 2025 - Medical Mission Team provides surgical services at Phebe Hospital and walk-in clinic at Hope Village School
